Last year our General Assembly got the ball rolling with several good changes to our N.C. concealed carry law and now the state of Georgia is trying to one up us. On April 23, 2014 Georgia Gov. Nathan Deal signed into law House Bill #60 the Safe Carry Protection Act of 2014. Under the new law which takes affect on July 15, 2014. Georgia CWP holders will have a much broader list of places they are allowed to carry in.

Concealed carry will be expanded to non-posted bars and churches, school-zones, Gov. buildings that don't have security and metal detectors and some parts of airports.

Just as it was in N.C. these changes to the GA. law are a great addition to the gun rights of Georgia citizens. For 2014 the NCRPA legislative team will work on making it legal to keep a firearm in a locked car on private property. A second project will be to find a way to make local governments follow state law and allow concealed carry in city and county parks and greenways. We are getting there slowly, and ever so slowly America is coming back to the ideas and ways that made this country great.

ASHE COUNTY WILDLIFE CLUB HOSTS STATE CHAMPIONSHIP FOR 200 & 300 YARD IBS CHAMPIONSHIP ON May 17, 2014

The Ashe County Wildlife Club hosted 27 shooters from New York, Maryland, Florida, Georgia, South Carolina and North Carolina on Saturday, May 17 for the 200 Yard & 300 Yard North Carolina State Championship of International Benchrest Shooting (IBS).

Benchrest shooting is a sport where shooters fire bullets from custom-made rifles equipped with powerful telescopic scopes at paper targets. The shooter must be skilled at reading how the wind direction and speed will affect the direction of the bullet, and the shooter must have a soft touch on the trigger to put the bullet in the bulls-eye three football fields distant.

Out-of-state shooters took all of the top spots. John Cascarino of Apalachin, NY won the top honor of first in Grand Aggregate (the combination of scores from both shooting categories). Cascarino also won the 200 Yard Championship, and finished third at 300 Yards. Dewey Hancock of Hebron, Md., won the 300 Yard Championship and finished second in Grand Aggregate. Ronnie Milford of Carnesville, Ga., finished third in Grand Aggregate, and finished second at 200 Yards. Kim Llwellyn, one of two women shooting, finished second at 300 Yards. Mike Rippy of Savannah, Ga., finished third at 200 Yards. The next IBS shoot at the Club will be June 28 for the 100 & 200 Meter North Carolina Championship. E.T. Weaver, president of the Ashe County Wildlife Club, was the top local shooter, finishing 8th in the Grand Aggregate. Jimmy Thompson, Swader Miller, Steve Eller, Jerry Powers, Rick Roe, and Rex Wyatt, all of Ashe County, also competed. This is the second IBS shoot the Ashe County Wildlife Club has hosted since creating the 300 yard range, one of the few in the southeastern United States. The new clubhouse has an overhang that protects 30 shooting benches from the sun and rain.

Where is all the .22lr Ammo?

Even though Sierra does not make .22 LR ammo or projectiles, we are constantly asked "Why can't I find any .22 LR ammo anywhere?" Even the conspiracy theorists are at a loss on this one as they can't even blame it on the government. They toss around thoughts of warehouses full of .22 LR rotting away just to keep it out of their hands, but that does not seem very realistic – even to them.

So what is going on here? Why is it that 1.5 years later, the shelves are still empty and bricks of .22 LR can still be seen selling for upwards of \$75-\$100 at gun shows? I do not believe there is one answer, but rather a few. Here are my opinions on the matter, for what they are worth.

Hoarders – Some people are piling it away in their basements, garages, bunkers, and under their beds due to fear of not being able to find it again. This is not a huge factor in it, but it is still a factor to some degree. When these hoarders can't find it on shelves, it only panics them more and causes them to buy even more when they do find it.

Gougers – These are the guys who prey on the fear of the hoarders. These are the guys that wait in line at Wal-Mart at 3 a.m. to buy up the daily allotment that Wal-Mart puts out at normal retail prices and then double or triple their price on the weekend gun show circuit. Again, not a huge factor, but keeping the shelves looking empty which keeps the panic level higher for those that are looking.

Demand – Now we are getting to the real meat of the issue. You hear manufactures say they are running 24/7 on their Rimfire lines which is putting somewhere around 25-30 million rounds PER DAY (estimate on my part from numbers I have heard from the big rimfire guys) into the market so how can there be a shortage? I have asked this myself - until we start doing even a little basic math. You hear all kind of numbers about how many firearms owners are in the USA, but you hear 70-80 million quite often. So for the sake of us not arguing that number - let's cut it to 35 million. Do you know a gun owner that does not own at least one firearm chambered in .22 LR? Do you know any that are not looking for .22 LR ammo or would at least buy some if they saw it for normal prices? How many would they buy when they found it? A lot - right? But again, just to keep the argument on the low end, let's say they would all be satisfied with just a single 500 pack. 35 million multiplied by 500 .22 LR rounds for them all - is 17.5 BILLION rounds. Let that sink in. Even at 25 million rounds being made PER DAY - that is 1.92 years' worth of production.

Starts making some sense then doesn't it? Hoarding and panic emptied the shelves. Gougers try and keep them empty and demand does keep them empty. Then factor in that I probably cut the real number of 22 LR shooters in ½ and probably underestimated the amount everyone would buy if they found it at normal prices by 300% and you can see how deep the problem really is and why it is not going to go away tomorrow. It also does not take into account the world market – just the USA.

How will it get better? Slowly. The hoarders will get to a point that they feel they have enough or will run out of money. The shelves will start getting enough on them that the gougers cannot buy it all. This will make people stop paying \$50-\$75 for a brick at gun shows. That will make it less profitable for the gougers to spend their money on and they will stop. The shelves will start to have product again which will ease people's fears and get them back to buying what they need today instead of what they need for the decade. There is no fast answer.

Are the manufactures hiring people for extra shifts and adding capacity sure they are. But it is easy to just expect them to ramp up production overnight to take care of our needs, but that is just not realistic. We get the same thing here. The market certainly has not grown 500% so what happens when companies add all that super expensive equipment when things get back to normal? They take a bath on it for sure and waste capital that they could have used to improve their company in a way that makes them stronger. Instead they just added equipment they may never need again and have to mothball while they lay off workers they no longer need. Not a great way to run a business and not a fair way to treat employees.

We all just have to trust that it will get better, do not buy more than we need and wait it out. It will not get better overnight. It will start out with a box here and there and then a few and then slowly the shelves will get back to having all the supply and selection we picky consumers are accustom to and will certainly appreciate much more than we ever did before.....if only for a little while.

A Crash in Ammunition Prices is Coming

Arizona - -(Ammoland.com)- The Obama caused bubble in ammunition prices seems ready to bust.

Over the last few years people have seen ammunition prices double or triple.

Handgun and rifle ammunition has been hard to find at times. .22 long rifle ammunition tripled in price over the last 18 months. People would line up to buy ammunition at prices two and three times the level that they were just two years ago.

All of that is about to change. Ammunition supply looks as though it is ready to catch up with demand. Centerfire pistol and rifle cartridges are available on most store shelves. When I walked into a local Wal-Mart this morning, their were over 30 signs on the ammunition case indicating a rollback of prices by 10-15%.

In classic economic fashion, the bubble was fueled by actions of the Federal government. Many federal agencies bought enormous quantities of ammunition. While the quantities were only a small percentage of total production, the raw figures fueled conspiracy theories. Obama administration actions fueled fear of coming shortages, gun bans, registration of ammunition sales, even potential low level warfare. All of this led to the current bubble of ammunition sales.

In response, the economy reacted the way that free markets are supposed to work. Ammunition suppliers started running their manufacturing plants day and night, adding additional shifts. Importers scoured the world markets, trying to buy everything they could to satisfy the insatiable demand. Foreign manufacturers bumped up their production to try to fill the desire for more and more ammunition. Ammunition production was at the highest level ever for small arms, short of war.

But unlike during war, this ammunition was not being fired in combat. Most of it was not being fired at all. It was being stored against future need. Very little was actually being used.

There are limits to this sort of demand. I gave away a couple of thousand .22 rounds to make a point. A person who only had 37 .22 shells out of a box of 50 is well justified in wanting a thousand or two, or a case of 5,000 "just because". Once they have the 5,000, their desire for more becomes less. Then demand drops, likely below pre-bubble levels for a while.

In the meantime, manufactures cannot stop production instantly. They have orders in the pipeline. They have supplies coming in that they have no storage space for. They have employees that they have trained and who they do not want to lay off. For all these reasons, demand drops suddenly, but supply cannot drop as quickly. As supply took a while to spin up, it will take a while to spin down.

This means that retailers and wholesalers will be saddled with a glut of merchandise that they cannot sell at the current high prices. They will have to put it on sale. Lower prices bring about the expectation that prices will fall even further. The prices crash.

That is when a prudent person buys what they want, at very good prices. Demand will not stay at the artificially low prices of the crash. The new crop of urban, hip, shooters will want to feed their equipment, and the new demand will be higher than it was before the bubble, but it will take a while to settle out.

Metal prices have already fallen from the highs of the bubble. Copper and lead are far lower than they were. You will know that the bubble is close to the bottom when you see .22 LR on sale for below 4 cents per round. At the lowest, we might see .22 cartridges below \$10 for 500.

Where is all the gun powder?

This is from the owner of Powder Valley..one of the largest reloading stores in the United States. Further... "Matt" refers to Matt Reams Vice President of Sales for Sierra in reference to a letter Matt published in reference to .22LR ammo.

Follow up to Matt's 22LR letter: I have a few tidbits of "opinionated statements" to make regarding the powder shortage. Matt makes some great points on how the primary problem is demand driven. The difference between 22LR and components is that manufacturers must make a choice on what components go to their ammo or other manufacturers ammo and what goes to reloaders. If you look at the supply of Winchester and Remington components you will find that there just aren't hardly any to be had anywhere. Based on that the only logical interpretation is that Winchester and Remington are allotting their components to ammo. In order to produce their ammo and leave the reloaders with nothing they must have a great supply of powder.

I believe the primary supplier of powder to Remington and Winchester is St Marks in Florida. All of Winchester powders are produced by St Marks. St Marks also produces powder such as Titegroup, H335, H110 and you can pretty much say if it is a spherical powder it probably comes from St Marks. Every US packager of powder I have spoken with states they have received hardly any canister powder from St Marks since the third quarter of 2013.

In addition, Hodgdon has been limited to one container of power per vessel out of Australia since December 2012. Typically Hodgdon had two containers of powder on each vessel. This is due to port authority rule changes in New Zealand and now Australia. Why these changes were made is anybody's guess. However, in a recent conversation with Hodgdon they believe this is going to be resolved in the very near future. Hodgdon is the largest player in the US market for smokeless powder. You just took the largest player in the market and cut their supply in half. Take into account the fire at ADI that burned the Clays and you can see that the high demand is not the only driver in the supply shortage for smokeless powder. Thankfully the supply out of General Dynamics in Canada has been much better. However no increase in production from a single manufacturer will make up for the drop in supply to Hodgdon and the extreme powder allocation St Marks is making to the ammo manufacturers vs. the reloaders.

Again this is one man's opinion. So, feel free to fire away and I will provide you my two cents.
