The President's Column

As I begin to write this we are well into a new year. Last night President Biden gave his State of the Union Address and according to him things couldn't be better. I may be just a poor ole country boy but I can smell a load of BS when it passes by. There was the expected call for an Assault Weapons ban undoubtedly an attempt to support Senator Diane Feinstein's assault weapons \ high capacity magazine ban bill in the Senate. At present with a Republican controlled House of Representatives it will most likely be stopped.

On the home front here in good ole North Carolina things actual look good on the gun rights front. The pistol permit repeal bill and the church school carry bill which were both passed by the legislature in 2022 but vetoed by the Governor will be back this year. In the 2022 mid-term election republicans won enough seats to cut Governors Coopers veto majority to one vote. Our Lobbying Firm thinks that at least one or more Democrat votes can be turned to override the Governors expected veto. In addition a bill legalizing constitutional carry which is essentially the ability to carry concealed without a permit has been proposed. It to will be vigorously supported by NCRPA.

In the effort to maintain and protect the Firearms rights of the citizens of North Carolina NCRPA maintains a constant presense at the Legislature when it is in session. Our Director of Legislative Issues Dennis Allen

is regularly at the Legislative Building and knows most everyone there on a first name basis. In addition we retain the prestigious North Carolina lobbying firm KTS Associates to work with us to protect YOUR firearms rights. Dennis and the good folks at KTS stay in close commutation to keep up with all the gun legislation both developing and proposed.

This brings me to my last point. In our modern society with over 350 million citizens some forms of gun control are necessary. Background checks for criminal behavior and mental competency are necessary. People who can't at least conform to the basic rules not to murder, steal, abuse women and children or have serous mental problems should not have firearms. That being said the Second Amendment rights of law abiding citizens to own and use any type of firearm they see as necessary for the legal uses they see as necessary in the course of living their day to day lives must be defended at all costs. In the future all leaders and candidates for leadership. i.e. politicians must support the right of the common citizen to possess all types of firearms. Significant changes ATF Form 4473

Of interest to the NCRPA gun buying public: NICS Denial Notification Act and the Bipartisan Safer Community Act (BSCA), Significant changes ATF Form 4473 (the form filled out when a firearm is purchased from a licensed dealer) are as follows:

- 1. Any firearm, received by a FFL, that was privately made (not manufactured by another licensee) must now be recorded on the ATF Form 4473. "Privately Made Firearm (PMF)" has been added to item 1, Section A. It now reads: "Manufacturer and Importer, if any or Privately made firearm (PMF) (If the manufacturer and importer are both different, include both)".
- 2. Question 10 is amended: The transferee/buyer is now asked to answer whether they "Reside in City Limits?" regarding their residence address. For example, if a transferee lists their residence city/state as Phoenix, Arizona but they actually reside outside of the city, they will answer "no" to this item.
- 3. The following two prohibiting questions have been added to Section A:
 - 1. 21b: "Do you intend to purchase or acquire any firearm listed on this form and any continuation sheet(s) or ammunition, for sale of other disposition to any person described in questions 21(c)-(m) or to a person described in question 21.n.1 who does not fall within a nonimmigrant exception?"
 - 2. 21.c.: "Do you intend to sell or otherwise dispose of any firearm listed on this form and any continuation sheet(s) or ammunition in furtherance of any felony or other offense punishable by imprisonment for a term of more than one year, a Federal crime of terrorism, or a drug trafficking offense"

4.	To comply with the BSCA 10-day waiting period on certain transfers involving transferees under the age of 21, Section C of the Form has been revised as follows:
	1. Prior to the NICS/POC information, an instructional header has been added stating: "Notice: If transferee/buyer is under 21, a waiting period of up to 10 days may apply where notification from NICS is received within 3 business days to further investigate a possible disqualifying juvenile record. A NICS check is only valid for 30 calendar days from the date recorded in question 27a."
	2. Item 27.c. was amended to show the date an FFL may transfer a firearm should NICS or the State agency (conducting the background check) not reply stating more time is needed for the check. It now reads next to the delayed check box: "The firearm(s) may be transferred on if time period is not extended by NICS or the appropriate State agency, and State law allows (optional)."
	3. A box has been added to 27.d. should NICS or the appropriate State agency delay the check as more time is needed to conduct it on a transferee under 21 years of age. It now reads: "Notice of additional delay of transferee under 21 years of age received on (date), and may be transferred on (date)."
	4. Also added to 27.d. is a box for FFLs to check should no response be received from NICS or the appropriate State agency (for transferees under 21 years of age) within 10 business days after the initial delay was given. It now reads: "No response was provided within 10 business days after initial delay for transferee/buyer under 21."

I'm former law enforcement,

and the Second Amendment saves lives

I'm a former law enforcement officer for 20 years and a former U.S. Marine who served for four years. I had the luxury of being trained on several different weapons and firearms. I am not only an advocate for the Second Amendment but am very familiar with training and firearm safety. First, one should be knowledgeable of local, state, and federal laws pertaining to your firearm. Paramount is the specifics of when you can use it to protect yourself and your loved ones. An educated, law-abiding gun owner and one who practices with their firearm at a range are better prepared to face the dangers lurking in our society. I'm comparing this to someone who just goes into a gun store, buys a firearm, and doesn't take the time to educate and practice with their firearm at a gun range.



Wayne Kyle, a father of former U.S. Navy SEAL Chris Kyle, said, "There are three types of people in this world: sheep, wolves, and sheepdogs. Some people prefer to believe that evil doesn't exist in the world, and if it ever darkened their doorstep, they wouldn't know how to protect themselves. Those are the sheep. Then you've got the predators who use violence to prey on the weak. They're the wolves. And then there are those that are blessed with a gift of aggression, an overpowering need to protect the flock. These men are the rare breed who live to confront the wolf. They are the sheepdog." We, the American citizenry, have the right to keep and bear arms per the U.S. Constitution, but we also have a God-given right to defend ourselves from the "wolves." The Bible states in Exodus 22:2, "If a thief is found breaking in and is struck so that he dies, there shall be no bloodguilt for him." Also, in Luke 11:21, it says, "When a strong man fully armed, guards his own palace, his goods are safe."

Time and time again, the liberal media loves reporting about murders committed with a firearm. They fail to mention this person, at least most of the time, obtained the firearm illegally. One just needs to look at liberal-run cities across America with the strictest gun laws to see they have a higher murder rate. The left claims we need more gun laws, and that will save lives. Not so! More laws are not what we need. Instead, district attorneys need to prosecute these criminals who illegally obtain and use firearms, and our judges also need to sentence them accordingly.

Why does the liberal media not promote more stories of law-abiding citizens who used a legal firearm and, by lawful means, to protect innocent lives? For example, Jack Wilson, a churchgoer and a member of the West Freeway Church of Christ security team in Texas. Wilson shot an assailant who had just shot two church members. Out of the 240 people in attendance, how many lives would have been lost if Mr. Wilson had not been there that day? A 12-year-old boy in Goldsboro, North Carolina, shot and killed one of two intruders who broke into his grandmother's home and shot her. Due to the bravery of this pre-teen, he saved the lives of several family members, including himself.

This vignette hits close to home. My parents were leaving the Duke Energy Center for the Performing Arts in Raleigh one late Friday evening several years ago. As they were walking to their car together, my dad walked to open the door for my mom. Ever alert, he noticed a man walking toward my mom. My dad quickly told the man to stop, but the man did not. He either did not hear or care. In response, my dad reached and drew his firearm. My dad presented his firearm at low ready. He never pointed it at the man. The man stopped, looked at my dad, slowly turned around, and walked away. If my dad did not have the right to own a firearm and legally carry his firearm, this story would not have been a happy one.

If those of us who are responsible and law-abiding gun owners do not take a stand to protect our Second Amendment rights and our God-given rights, then George Mason would be right when he said, "To disarm the people; that is the best and most effectual way to enslave them."

Over the tenure of Governor Roy Cooper, we have been successful in passing several laws through the legislative process only to have them vetoed by the Governor. These include last legislative session's pistol "Purchase Permit Repeal" (HB398), "Enact the Religious Assembly Security and Protection Act of 2021 and to Authorize Concealed Cary for Certain Law Enforcement Facility Employees" (SB43), and "Providing That a Concealed Carry Permittee Who Allows Their Permit To Lapse Does Not Have To Take Another Firearms Safety And Training Course Upon Applying for Renewal Under Certain Conditions" (HB49).

Each of these bills were the will of the Legislature and were passed with bi-partisan support. They were all vetoed by our Governor, showing his disregard for the rights and safety of the citizens of NC.

While the Republican Party made gains in the Legislature in the recent elections, it failed to deliver a "veto proof" legislature this session by one House of Representatives member. It is our hope that because of the narrowness of the Democratic success in the House, we can persuade enough Democrats to see our position and vote appropriately, despite the pressure applied by Governor Cooper and the Democrat Party.

On January 30, 2023, Senator <u>Danny Britt</u>, along with Senators <u>Warren Daniel</u> and <u>Jim Perry</u> filed <u>Senate Bill 40</u>, "Pistol Purchase Permit Repeal", and <u>Senate Bill 41</u>, "Protect Religious Meeting Places". We are hopeful that as the session progresses, we can encourage more pro-constitution, pro-self-defense bills to be introduced.

Go to North Carolina Legislature website to find your representatives and search for bills. Spend some time on the site, there is a wealth of information available there.

Please take the time to look at the bills noted above and drop our pro-gun friends a quick email thanking them. You will notice that along with the Primary Sponsors, there are many more senators that are supporting the bills as sponsors. They are supporting our rights; we should let them know that we support them.

If you are in a district with anti-constitution Representatives and Senators, politely let them know that you support our rights and expect no less from them.

This message is going to over 95,000 NRA members. If you take a few moments to contact your legislative representative, you can be a part of a very loud voice. Let our legislature and Governor hear that voice!

North Carolina: Pro-2A Measures Pass House, State Senate

Thursday, February 16, 2023

The North Carolina Senate voted 29-19 to pass Senate Bill 41, a bill that recognizes law-abiding citizens' right to self-defense while attending a church with a school attached and, also, repeals the redundant permitto-purchase system. The House passed, House Bill 49, a similar pro-self-defense bill to Senate Bill 41, by a vote of 77-43. Garnishing bipartisan support in the House for the self-defense bill indicates a potential override of any veto by Governor Roy Cooper, who vetoed similar legislation in 2021 and 2020.

NRA-ILA thanks the Senate leadership of Senator Danny Britt, Senator Jim Perry, Senator Warren Daniel, Senator Phil Berger, and others for fighting to protect the rights of North Carolina's law-abiding citizens. Also, on the House side, NRA-ILA thanks Speaker Tim Moore and Representative Jeff McNeely for their tireless efforts to advance Second Amendment freedom in the Tar Heel State.

Senate Bill 41 enables law-abiding citizens who hold a concealed handgun permit to carry a handgun to defend themselves and their loved ones when attending religious worship taking place on private property that is both a school and a place of worship, if it does not prohibit firearms. This empowers private property owners to set their own security policy, rather than the state imposing a one-size-fits-all solution. In 2019, an armed citizen in Texas defended his church against an individual. This worshiper, Jack Wilson, was able to take action because of similar NRA-backed legislation in Texas

The permit-to-purchase system was created before modern, computerized

background checks existed. The federal NICS checks licensed firearms dealers conduct are often completed in minutes. Repealing the permitto-purchase a firearm ensures that law-abiding citizens can exercise their Second Amendment rights without this unnecessary obstacle and fee that is also a burden on lawenforcement resources.

North Carolina: House Passes Permit-to-Purchase Repeal

Wednesday, February 22, 2023

Today, the House of Representatives voted 68-47 to pass House Bill 50, the House companion bill to Senate Bill 40 that repeals the permit-to-purchase a firearm requirement. HB 50 eliminates the redundant background check.

As previously reported, the National Instant Criminal Background Check System (NICS) is already in place to do background checks and instantly provides that information to firearm dealers. A NICS check is done instantly, while a permit-to-purchase application can take up to 30 days.
